She captures her audiences through her passionate stories and native songs, delivering the universal messages of harmony, equality, dignity and respect for mankind. Shannon will be performing with Sandy Horne, renowned bassist with the Canadian rock band, "The Spoons". The pair will be appearing at Aichi Shukutoku University on June 30th and on the Global Common Stage 2 from July 4-7 at 2:30 pm.
