Tower of the Sun ★Osaka, 1970

Visitors to the Osaka Expo were greeted by the fourfaced Tower of the Sun with arms spread wide. The dynamic tower, worthy of representing Japan's first World Exposition, greatly impressed people worldwide. In addition, this Expo sparked the popularity of fried chicken and pizza in Japan.

The Chicago Expo featured an amusement park called the Midway Plaisance. Its number-one attraction was the great Ferris Wheel, which had an impressive diameter of 76 meters and as many as 36 cars holding 60 people each.

Visitors will be able to ride in the world's first driverless vehicles, on show for the first time at EXPO 2005, as well as futuristic trams traveling around the Global Loop. Of course, all of these systems embody next-generation environmental technology. Be among the first to experience the Earth-friendly transportation technology of the future.

Transit Systems at the Nagakute Area

Intelligent Multimode Transit System (IMTS)

Advanced information technology will allow three large-capacity, low-pollution driverless buses to travel around the site in electronically controlled formations.


Global Tram

This fascinating and dramatic vehicle will travel around the Global Loop. Batterypowered to reduce the burden on the environment, it will provide an enjoyable way to tour and view the Loop.

Site Access

The Expo sites are located about 20 kilometers east of downtown Nagoya.

To reduce traffic congestion and the environmental load. visiters are encouraged to use public transport, such as trains and buses. There are no parking areas for private cars at the Expo sites. Please use one of the six park-and-ride parking lots (parking fee payable) located in adjoining areas. The trip to the site by parking lot shuttle bus (free) will take between 15 and 35 minutes.
